Dear Cat Lovers and CRAN Supporters,

With your support and generosity, Cat Rescue and Adoption Network (CRAN) continues to rescue, heal and find loving homes for homeless and abandoned cats in our community. Thanks to your donations already this year we have spayed/neutered nearly 400 cats, found new homes for about 300 cats, and cared for almost 600 cats and kittens.

Kittens like these, seven in all, born outdoors by a dangerous road to a protective momma with an owner who loved her deeply, but could not afford to get her spayed. CRAN took in the little family, found them a wonderful foster who kept them all safe so mom could nurture them



while they grew. When they were ready, mom was spayed and vaccinated then returned to her owner where she will no longer contribute to the cat overpopulation problem. And the kittens, now big and strong, have all been spayed or neutered too and are quickly finding loving families of their own.

Many of the cats and kittens we help are sick or injured and need medical care. We continue our long history of providing treatment for cats like little Baby Grey who contracted ringworm, and are proud that other animal groups have followed our lead and are no longer euthanizing cats just because they caught a fungus.

CRAN is an all-volunteer organization helping cats and the people who love them right here in Lane County since 2006. We rely on our network of volunteer foster homes to care for, house

and socialize the cats in our care until they find their new homes. We receive no government funding and are entirely supported by adoption fees and the generosity of donors like you.

Costs have gone up dramatically recently, in veterinary medicine and cat rescue just like everywhere else. Our budget for 2024 is \$325,550 with 83% of those expenses going to medical costs. Vet care our cats need includes spay/neuter surgeries, vaccinations, parasite control, diagnosing and treating upper respiratory infections, heart murmurs, urinary tract infections, ringworm, giardia, coccidia, eye infections, ear infections, bacterial infections, broken bones and rotten teeth just to name a few.
